In Senegal, the fight against violence saw significant progress in 2023 in the context of prevention and care. As part of prevention, UN Women supported civil society organizations (Association of People with Disabilities, Keur Massar Youth Association, Bajenu Gox Women’s Association of Guédiawaye, Sedhiou and Kolda) to raise awareness communities on violence against women and girls. More than 5,000 people reached out through awareness and fun activities. The training of journalists, bloggers and influencers has helped amplify our voices to end violence and reduce gender inequalities. An awareness campaign on positive masculinity reached more than 2,000 people in the communities of Sandiara, Ndiop, Bargny, Moint Rolland and Ndiaffate. A change in behavior is noted in the budgeting of local authorities which now take into account the specific needs of women and girls. At the community level, men are increasingly participating in the fight for gender equality thanks to the project to support community leaders for a change in behavior in favor of gender equality
